
## **Hogmanay Grams**

A spurtle makes a perfect, fun, and useful Holiday gift. Scottish Spurtles can be found online and along with a bag of Steel Cut Oats is the perfect gift. My favorite way to cook steel cut oats is on the back of the Bob's Red Mill Brand. I like to turn a bowl of steel cut oats into a breakfast bowl. I add pecans, diced apples, golden raisins, flax seed, cinnamon, and vanilla to cook with the steel cut oats. This can all be added whole cooking. When cooked, I put them in a bowl and add a dollop of yogurt, milk, and a dusting of fresh ground nutmeg. Spurtles are a great gift any time of year. Always remember that in order to get the spurtle magic, use the spurtle in your right hand and stir clockwise to bring good luck to you now and in your future. And after you get a lot of spurtle and oats making practice, be sure and join the Midnight Sun Spurtle contest in 2025. ## **Blackness Castle**

Blackness Castle was once a royal castle of James II built in the 15th-century as a fortress on the south shore of the Firth of Forth protecting Edinburgh and Fife.

The castle had the most advanced artillery fortifications of its time in Scotland. However, a century later, Oliver Cromwell's Armies took the castle in 1650. The English converted into a prison and a garrison. The Castle held French prisoners of war during the series of conflicts of to include the Napoleonic Wars and the American Revolution.

In 1870 it became the central ammo depot for Scotland until the end of WWI. After WWII the castle was made into a historical monument. The castle has been used as a filming location in several productions, including Hamlet (1990), *The Bruce (1996), Outlander* (2014 and 2015), and "Rise of the Clans".

Tantallon Castle, property of the Earls of Fife, likewise defends the Firth of Forth since the 14<sup>th</sup> century. The Earls of Fife, also known as the Earls of Douglas claimed the

chieftain in 1358. The Douglas clan and the Stewarts weave claim to the castle. Several septs of the clan created the Red and Black Douglas. The claims weave into the Earls of Angus, Lennox, and Albany.



It became a royal fortress for James V of Scotland during the English Reformation, though it changed hands multiple times during the Scottish Reformation and was besieged and damaged in 1651. The worst insult to the castle's history was when the 12<sup>th</sup> Earl of Angus (2<sup>nd</sup> Marquess of Douglas) sold the property to pay his gambling debts. The castle's last hurrah was during WWII, preparations for Normandy were practiced here using aluminum foil and bombers and radar to fake the Germans into believing there were forces staged there for storming Demark not the French beaches of Normandy.
